### Guest speaker: Jessica Rowden, Equity and Inclusion Lead for UGDSB.

Jessica was a student, parent and also staff in this district and thus has a good understanding of the community. She is available to support the community, staff and students. She works with a diverse group of people to incorporate anti-racism initiatives into the curriculum. Our education system is fundamentally colonial, because it was introduced by colonialists. John Black Public School is on the leading edge of anti-racist initiatives and education which is surprising given the overwhelming number of white, cis-gendered persons in the community. We all have an implicit bias, because our brains are wired to find shortcuts so that we won't always have to focus on all the choices at once - this means that we make assumptions.

She would like to help us navigate the topic of Pierpoint Park, to help us to remember the Black community in Centre Wellington, without putting the responsibility on the Black community to organize the remembrance. We think of Fergus as a Scottish community, but we need to educate the school community that there were others who founded this area and also that Richard Pierpoint was a Black Muslim man. We need to be careful how he is depicted, since we have no photos of him, thus we may be biased in our depiction. We also need to remember others who founded this area, not just Richard Pierpoint (ie. women, children, Indigenous peoples). White women especially are focused on the action of "fixing" a problem that presents itself. We need to take our time in understanding what the problem is before we can go about finding a solution. This is where Jessica may be able to help.

Sarah Schoettler confirmed that the quote has come on from Trillium Outdoor Services. The cost of excavating the area for the gaga Ball pit will be \$1500 + HST and the cost of the gaga ball pit will be \$2000 + HST. There are 2 potential locations for the pit, both have been submitted to UGDSB for approval before construction begins. If all goes well, it is hoped to be installed before the school year ends, but it is likely it may be in July instead.

Melissa Mulligan recommended that we bring forward motions for spending now since we can't carry this balance over.

#### 6. School council business items

- a. Action items
  - i. The council is working towards finding ways to support the school in addressing racism amongst students and in the community.
  - ii. \$250 has been donated to the school to purchase anti-racism teaching tools.
  - iii. Post to Facebook about offering alternatives to pizza in 2022/23 school year: Margaret investigated the use of Survey Monkey to send the survey out to parents via email in addition to Facebook. The limitations on the number of questions and the responses we get access to make this option less viable. Sarah Schoettler volunteered the use of the John Black email to send this survey out to parents. Sarah deLange will also send the questions out via Facebook.
- b. Facebook update: nothing to report.
- c. Google survey to parents (food choices for next year): see above (action items iii).
- d. Family event at Pierpoint Park: Melissa pointed out that a few things could make the event potentially hazardous. Security at the park regarding the proximity of the river and young children, our understanding of the history behind the land, Black and Indigenous rights is not sufficient to make this a theme during the event. Also COVID will still make gathering in large numbers risky. Thus the event is put off until September so there is more time to plan. This will be an Open House event.
- e. Cold Treat Days: There was much discussion over whether to donate treats to the school, rather than to make this a fundraiser. Also whether ice cream or freezies contained too much sugar. It was agreed that the school council should make a donation, and that watermelon slices would be appropriate. Melissa introduced a Motion: to spend \$250 on watermelon for the students. Seconded by Carrie-Ann. Motion carried.
