



Students with Life-Threatening Medical Conditions UGDSB Policy 518:

Students with Life-Threatening Medical Conditions, outlines the roles and responsibilities for all in the educational community to support students with possible life-threatening medical conditions. The prevalent medical conditions covered under this policy are Asthma, Anaphylaxis, Diabetes and Epilepsy/Seizure Disorders. If your child has one of these, or any other life-threatening medical condition, please visit: www.ugdsb.ca/board/policy (and look for Policy 518) or contact the school as soon as possible. We will work with you to develop a Plan of Care to support your child.

Feedback welcome on draft board policies:

The Upper Grand District School Board is welcoming public input on draft policies. Currently under review is: Policy 503 – Safe Schools (Student Discipline, Bullying Prevention and Intervention, Suspension and Expulsion) This policy is important to students, staff, parents and guardians, school councils and the school community because everyone plays a role in maintaining a positive school climate and ensuring a safe, inclusive, and accepting learning and working environment in our schools. You are invited to review the draft documents and submit online feedback at www.ugdsb.ca/board/policy. The deadline for public input is October 25, 2018 at 4 p.m. EST. Persons without internet access may call 519-822-4420 (or toll-free 1-800-321-4025) ext. 723 to request a printed copy of the draft documents.

Student Accident Insurance Reminder for parents/guardians: Accidents happen – be prepared with Student Accident Insurance.

Parents/guardians are responsible for expenses related to student injuries on school premises during school activities. Accidents can and do happen and the costs involved might not be fully covered by Provincial Health Care or employer group insurance plans.

The Upper Grand District School Board is empowered under The Education Act to offer Accident and Life Insurance for students.

Information will be sent home with respect to Student Accident Insurance offered by Old Republic Insurance Company of Canada. You should receive:

- 1. The Director's letter and an Acknowledgment to be signed by parents/guardians and returned to school. Attached to the Director's letter is a translation sheet for your reference.
- 2. An InsureMyKids application form

Old Republic offers a variety of options, including family rates and multi-year plans, at affordable prices. The cost must be paid by parents/guardians.

For today's active children, especially those who participate in field trips, co-curricular and other school activities outside the school day, Student Accident Insurance is valuable.

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Smoke-Free Environment

The Upper Grand DSB provides a smoke-free environment for its students, staff and others while on school Board property, in accordance with the Smoke-Free Ontario Act. This policy refers to all forms of tobacco, and any processed form of tobacco that may be smoked, inhaled or chewed, including e-cigarettes.

Smudging is the tradition of using sacred smoke from sacred medicines (e.g., tobacco and sage) that forms part of the indigenous culture and spirituality. Smudging is allowed in schools under the Smoke-Free Ontario Act. Parents will be informed using the school's usual forms of communication when smudging is going to occur in our school. Participation by staff and students is optional in a smudging ceremony.

Life-Threatening Allergies

We have children in our school with potential life-threatening allergies to various foods and other materials called anaphylaxis. This is a medical condition that causes a severe reaction to food or other materials, and can cause death within minutes. In recent years, anaphylaxis has increased dramatically among students. Our school has procedures in place for the prevention and management of anaphylactic reactions. If your child has health concerns of any kind, please tell your child's teacher or the office and we will take the necessary health protection steps. Thank you for your understanding in ensuring an allergy-safe environment for all of our students.

Re: School Organizations

Schools have built class lists based on their tentative organizations. Changes may be necessary at your child(ren)'s school in order that our Board remain compliant with Ministry parameters (see below). Any changes would be implemented by Monday, September 18th. Principals do not have the option of changing the school

organization that is set by the District Staffing Committee of the Board. If changes affect your child(ren), you will be informed by the school.

Ministry of Education Parameters:

- *Full Day Kindergarten Class Size Average for the Board is 26 students
- *90% of the Board's primary classes with 20 or fewer students
- *10% of the Board's primary classes up to a maximum of 23 students
- *Grade 3/4 classes have a cap of 23 students
- *Junior/Intermediate Class Size Average for the Board is 24.85 students to 1 teacher

Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy

The Freedom of Information Act directs schools to be careful about the information they collect about students and it limits how schools can use this information. Please read the Freedom of Information letter carefully and respond if desired. It is understood that we have FOI consent unless we receive a written objection from you.



School Photo Day

Photo Day at l'École Edward Johnson will be Thursday, September 27th. Please try to avoid any appointments for your child on this day so that all our students can have their individual photos taken and most of all, be part of the traditional class photo. We'll expect everyone to be wearing their smiles to school on the 28th!

School Supplies

Many parents enquire about school supplies for September. While we provide for most of the essential supplies such as notebooks and writing utensils, here are some suggestions for items that you may purchase to assist your child at school.

Primary – pencils, pencil crayons, pencil case, school bag or backpack, markers, glue, stick, gym shoes.

Junior – pencils, pencil crayons, pencil case, pens, markers, small scissors, metric ruler, gym shoes.

First Nation, Métis, Inuit Self-identification

If your child is a member of a First Nation, the Métis or the Inuit, then please consider having him or her self-identify. Self-identification helps in several ways: 1. Students will have access to more culturally relevant programming and

opportunities for unique cultural and academic experiences 2. The school system will have an opportunity to focus efforts and resources, as well as an increased awareness of the diverse needs of indigenous families. 3. The school community will have an opportunity for building relationships to increase student success and well being. Share your pride in your heritage! Please have come to the office (or have your child do so) to get a card that can be filled in and submitted if you wish to self-identify. Data will be protected and governed by the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act.



Agendas

Agendas are a great tool for organizing school work and communicating with home. We have made them available for the Grade 1-6 students at the cost of \$7.00. The school pays for the agendas, but we do ask families to consider making a donation to offset the cost. The recommended amount is \$7, but we will gratefully accept any amount you feel you can manage at this point. You can make the payment online using School Cash Online by September 30th or you can bring cash to the office. Thank you very much. Please be sure to check your child's agenda for deadlines, assignments, and upcoming events.

School Code of Conduct

Our School Code of Conduct has been uploaded to our school website for your perusal. We ask that you please read and review this document with your child. Being informed about our school will help everyone know what is expected and what needs to be done.

Aizan Messaging System

École Edward Johnson will be using the Aizan messaging system for school-wide notifications. This system will be used when information needs to be communicated with our school population in a timely manner (bus cancellations,

school closures, emergencies, etc.). When used, this system will place one call per household to communicate information. The system is currently registered to call the home number (if you do not have one, it is set up to call the provided cell number). If you do not answer, it will leave a voice message with the caller ID being the school number (519-763-7374). Please call Mrs. Buitendyk or Mrs. Wainman should you have any questions. (Note: In the event of power failure, we will not be able to access the system.)

Volunteers

The importance of parent involvement in student achievement and success in school is well documented and recognized as an essential ingredient. At École Edward Johnson, we welcome parent volunteers to help by preparing learning materials for teachers, assisting in classes and on trips, supervising on special event days or in the library. If you are interested in becoming a regular volunteer at the school, please ask to see Mrs. Wainman. Volunteers are asked to complete a form which is kept on file at the office.

Student Lunchroom Behaviour Expectations and Responsibilities

The following lunchroom expectations have been discussed at school. Students understand that while eating lunch in the classroom, they are expected to respect the rights of others by:

- sitting in assigned seats
- speaking in soft, indoor voices
- not sharing or asking for others' food
- following the direction of the lunchroom supervisor and the student helpers
- leaving to go to the bathroom only with permission from the lunchroom supervisor
- waiting to be dismissed before going outside
- placing items in the garbage or recycling bins when dismissed to go outside
- ensuring that their area is clean before leaving

Safe Arrival Program

We appreciate your calls when your child(ren) are going to be absent or late. Please call the school at 519-763-7374 ext.100 and leave a message. You do not

need to speak to the school secretary to report an absence or late arrival. The school's answering machine is available to the community 24 hours a day. Calling in advance also alleviates early morning telephone congestion. Thank you for your support.



Anti- Bullying Plan

A detailed Anti-bullying Plan will be updated and posted to our website by the end of September. This plan is created by our Safe Schools Committee which consists of school staff, a community member, and parents. The committee uses data from the Climate Survey that all students and some families took in the spring. I will let you know when it has been prepared for the year and you will be invited to access it from our website so you will know how we plan to continue to reduce the amount of bullying at school. Talking About Mental Health Sept 2018 – Heading Back to School



Hope that you had a wonderful summer! Transitioning back into school as summer ends can be exciting but also can be stressful for some children and families. As the children and youth head back to school, here are a few suggestions on how to make this a mentally healthy school year for all.

- 1. Take care of your body. Mental and physical health are linked. Make sure to get enough sleep, drink water, and eat well.
- 2. Talk to your child/ren. What did they like and enjoy about last year? What are

they looking forward to this year? Have children name one thing they are looking forward to and one thing they are not looking forward to as much.

- 3. **Identify strengths and challenges.** Have them name 2 things they are good at in school and two things that they think might be more difficult. Strategize some ways to deal with challenges. At the end of the day reflect any strategies used and encourage them to try new strategies to build their coping tool kit.
- 4. **Problem solve with your child/ren.** Provide your child opportunities to make their own decisions and to come up with solutions for their concerns.

Remember to keep your expectations realistic and age appropriate. 1. Remain calm, and show your child trust, support and love when they are feeling stressed, anxious and worried. Have a wonderful and mentally healthy school year!

Combined Grade (Split Grade) Classrooms

Combined classes group children from two or more consecutive grades into one classroom. Schools combine classes for a variety of reasons to meet the learning needs of students and to balance class sizes. All classrooms are created with students who have a range of skills and

abilities. As in same-grade classrooms, teachers, in combined grades, use a variety of strategies to ensure that the grade appropriate curriculum expectations are covered.

Combined classrooms are very common in schools today and they are neither better nor worse than single-grade classes. Studies have proven that students in combined grades do just as well academically as students in single-grade classrooms. The academic research on combined classrooms has outlined the benefits that students gain while in combined classes. These benefits include learning to work individually and as part of a team, development of leadership skills, development of decision-making skills, self-motivation, and responsibility. Student placement is carefully considered by school staff every year. Individual student needs, as well as class dynamics, are balanced to create school classrooms. When placing students in classrooms, the principal and all teachers take into consideration many different factors which include: the number of students, the number of boys and girls, student learning styles, academic strengths and needs, learning skills, work habits, and social and emotional strengths and needs. Whether the students are in an older or younger grade in a combined classroom, they will be challenged at their own academic level.

"Let nature be your teacher." William Wordsworth Celebrate National Tree Day on September 26th 2018! "National Tree Day will serve as a celebration for all Canadians to appreciate the great benefits that trees provide us - clean air, wildlife habitat, reducing energy demand and connecting with nature."

For children, studies show that time outdoors, especially unstructured time in more natural settings, can increase curiosity, creativity and problem solving ability. It also improves their physical fitness and coordination and reduces symptoms associated with attention deficit disorder. It can even reduce the likelihood of needing glasses for near-sightedness.

Some great activities for your family to do on Tree Day, or any day!

- Read a book on trees: The Lorax, by Dr. Seuss; The Giving Tree by Shel Silverstein; What Good Is a Tree by Larry Dane Brimner; The Great Kapok Tree by Lynne Cherry
- Learn the names of the trees in your backyard or neighbourhood.
- Do tree art e.g., a leaf collage, or leaf/bark pencil rubbing art, or tree photography
- Create a tree book: "adopt" a favourite tree, name it and throughout the year record and examine its characteristics and the changes that it goes through.
- Organize a Tree Walk game Look for trees that are: the tallest, oldest, has
 the widest trunk, has the largest leaf, is the most prickly, etc.
- Download a bird app and start to help your child learn to identify the colours and songs of birds in your neighbourhood
- Research all the great forest hiking trails in your area and pick one to try

out.

• Hold a Tree Day birthday party with your family, friends, neighbours or community! Serve tree-shaped foods! (Find lots of ideas on Pinterest.)
