Issues in Canadian Geography

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Course Description:

This course focuses on current geographic issues that affects Canadians. Students will draw on their personal and everyday experiences as they explore issues relating to food and water supplies, competing land uses, interactions with the natural environment, and other topics relevant to sustainable living in Canada. They will also develop an awareness that issues that affect their lives in Canada are interconnected with issues in other parts of the world. Throughout the course, students will use the concepts of geographic thinking, the geographic inquiry process, and spatial technologies to guide and support their investigations.

Course Big Ideas (overall learning outcomes for the course):

- Humans strive for sustainability but the potential for success is limited
- Reasons for change and the impacts of those changes are not always understood
- Many decisions have been made that have negatively impacted Canada's sustainability - it is not too late to make improvements in Canada's sustainability
- All Canadians have the responsibility of improving the sustainability of Canada and the world

Instructional Strategies: Westside teaching staff will use a variety of instructional strategies to help students develop and improve skills in the following areas: character, citizenship, communication, inquiry, critical thinking and problem-solving, collaboration and teamwork, and creativity and imagination.

Achievement Categories:

Student learning is assessed and evaluated with respect to the following four categories of knowledge and skills.

Knowledge & Understanding: 25%

Communication: 25%

Thinking: 25%

Application: 25%

Assessment and Evaluation: Formative assessments are used to improve student learning by providing varied opportunities to demonstrate an understanding of course expectations in preparation for summative assessments. Students are informally assessed on a regular basis. Summative assessments test groups of key expectations. Failure to complete a summative assessment will result in the expectations of the course not being met and the credit not being granted.

Assessment of Critical Thinking: The critical thinking processes are identified as: Democratic Discourse, Inquiry, and Problem Solving. Critical thinking will be continually assessed and is worth 20% of the Term Work mark.

Late Policy: Students are expected to complete all assigned work and submit it by the established due date. Every attempt will be made to encourage students to complete assigned work on time so the grade represents their actual achievement. A late penalty will be assigned if work is submitted beyond the due date. Extensions will be considered before the due date in case of extenuating circumstances.
