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Course Description:

This course provides opportunities for students to communicate and interact in French with increasing independence, with a focus on familiar topics related to their daily lives. Students will develop their skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing by using language learning strategies introduced in the elementary Core French program, and will apply creative and critical thinking skills in various ways. They will also enhance their understanding and appreciation of diverse French-speaking communities, and will develop skills necessary for lifelong learning in real-life situations.

Big Ideas (overall learning outcomes for the course):

- Lifelong language learning- Culture and Language are interdependent
- French language is a tool that can improve upon their native communication skills.
- Students can talk about past and present experiences, and about future plans
- Students feel comfortable speaking in impromptu situations
- Students are able to communicate their ideas in a written form

Instructional Strategies:

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Assessment and Evaluation: (Collection of Evidence: Product, Conversation, and Observation)

Formative assessments are used to improve student learning by providing varied opportunities to demonstrate an understanding of course expectations in preparation for summative evaluations. Summative evaluations test groups of key expectations. Failure to complete a summative evaluation may result in the expectations of the course not being met and the credit not being granted.
