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Course Description:

This course provides opportunities for students to communicate in French about personally relevant, familiar, and academic topics in real-life situations with increasing independence. Students will exchange information, ideas, and opinions with others in guided and increasingly spontaneous spoken interactions. Students will develop their skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing through the selective use of strategies that contribute to effective communication. They will also increase their understanding and appreciation of diverse French-speaking communities, and will develop skills necessary for lifelong language learning.

Prerequisite: Core French, Grade 9, Academic or Applied

Big Ideas (overall learning outcomes for the course) -- Students can...

- Participate in conversations with peers regarding past, present, future, and possible events
- Use pronouns to avoid repetition
- Understand the main ideas of written and spoken texts in French
- Give an opinion using learned expressions
- Accept and refuse an invitation
- Understand socio-cultural and socio-linguistic aspects of the French language
