Course Description:

This course is designed to develop the oral communication, reading, writing, and media literacy skills that students need for success in their secondary school academic programs and in their daily lives. Students will analyze literary texts from contemporary and historical periods, interpret informational and graphic texts, and create oral, written, and media texts in a variety of forms. An important focus will be on the use of strategies that contribute to effective communication. The course is intended to prepare students for the Grade 10 academic English course, which leads to university or college preparation courses in Grades 11 and 12.

Overall Learning Outcomes:

- Write a six-line paragraph that uses direct proof to answer a specific question
- Write a six-line paragraph that draws on indirect proof to support an opinion
- Formulate ideas and construct a response based on an image and title
- Formulate ideas and construct a response in a series of paragraphs to answer a specific question
- Use strategies to read a variety of texts and construct meaning
- Express ideas orally and respond to others' ideas orally
- Construct a paragraph that critically analyzes a piece of text

Instructional Strategies:

Westside teaching staff will use a variety of instructional strategies to help students develop and improve skills in the following areas:

character, citizenship, communication, critical thinking and problem solving, collaboration and teamwork, and creativity and imagination.
